Dear Commissioner Stephan,

Please find the attached correspondence between me and the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles' (BMV) Commissioner Donald M. Snemis regarding the City of Indianapolis' BlueIndy project. As you will gather from the correspondence, the BMV has refused to provide answers to my questions in writing. While they did extend an offer to meet with me in person, in lieu of a written response, I do not feel it would be appropriate to receive answers to these critical questions "in the dark", and without others whom need to know the answers receiving the same information.

Therefore, I have sent the BMV a request under Indiana Open Records Law, Indiana Code 5-14-3, to provide documentation about this project. My position remains that I am opposed to the tax increase and the agreement reached with the Indiana Office of Utility Consumer Counselor (OUCC). I am now very troubled by hearing that the current charging stations may not be certified by the Underwriters Laboratories (UL), which seemingly creates a safety issue since it is highly likely that the charging stations are on the same power grid that causes the downtown area so many problems. You might recall the explosion from a few weeks ago.

In light of this, I am again asking the Indiana Utility Regulatory Committee (IURC) to deny the tax increase and the agreement between the OUCC, City of Indianapolis, and the Indianapolis Power & Light Company (IPL); or, at the very least, delay the decision until all of the following actions have occurred:

- 1. The federal government has made a decision on whether the vehicles are safe and should be allowed on our streets and highways.
- 2. Documentation is received as proof that the electric charging stations have been approved for use by the UL.
- 3. Both of my letters to the BMV have been thoroughly answered, and information has been fully disclosed to me and other parties copied on the letters.

Dear Commissioner Snemis,

It is with great disappointment that I have learned that you are unwilling to answer and share basic information with me in writing regarding the BlueIndy project in Indianapolis. As stated in the attached email correspondence between your staff and mine, all parties copied on the letter should also be made aware of the answers to those questions as they are critical to the wellbeing of our community. A verbal conversation with me as a follow-up would be appropriate once the answers are received in writing, but refusal to place in writing basic answers could lead one to believe something is being hidden.

I am aware that you recently granted the federally unapproved electric vehicles temporary license plates. It remains unfortunate that the vehicles were allowed to be driven on our streets and highways for months without license plates and approval from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). I am further unclear about how the vehicles were granted temporary license plates even without federal approval of the vehicles' safety standards.

It has also come to my attention that the electric charging stations may not be Underwriters Laboratories (UL) certified. This is of serious concern, particularly since we recently had an Indianapolis Power & Light Company related explosion in the downtown area; just blocks from where an electric charging station is located. Please refer to this article from the August 14, 2014 edition of the Indianapolis Star http://www.indystar.com/story/news/2014/08/14/ipl-investigating-cause-underground-explosions/14076741/. Placing what may be extremely powerful uncertified charging stations in the downtown area that might be on the same electrical grid is not in the best interest of taxpayers.

In light of the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles' refusal to provide a written response answering the questions to my original letter in advance of a meeting, under the Indiana Open Records Law, Indiana Code 5-14-3, I am requesting a copy of all documents and correspondence as it relates to BlueIndy. This request includes, but is not limited to, BlueIndy's application, emails, and any supporting and supplemental documentation.

Dear Commissioner Snemis,

Many of my constituents have raised concerns about the electric vehicles that are being used on the city streets in Indianapolis. They have noticed that the vehicles don't display a license plate and that an operator of the vehicle does not need insurance. As you can imagine, these concerns have led to many questions. Please provide an answer to the following questions?

- Is it legal for one to operate a motor vehicle on a street without a license plate, or any tag
 indicating its authorization to be operated on the street or highway?
- Does the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles grant waivers approving the operation of motor
 vehicles on public thoroughfares that have not passed the United States Department of
 Transportation's motor vehicle safety standards and regulations? If yes, under what circumstances
 would there be a waiver and what is the extent of the waiver?
- Is it legal for one to operate a vehicle without any insurance? Further, is there a waiver to operate
 a motor vehicle without insurance? If yes, under what circumstances would there be a waiver,
 how long, and to what extent?
- Hypothetically, if an accident were to occur, the U.S. Department of Transportation has not
 approved the BlueIndy vehicles, and the driver does not have auto insurance, who is the
 responsible party for damages that might occur to that person, others involved in the accident, and
 any property damaged?
- If the BlueIndy vehicle does not pass U.S. Department of Transportation standards, can the
 vehicle legally be operated on streets and highways? Further, would allowing BlueIndy vehicles
 to operate on a) streets or b) interstates without passage of U.S. Department of Transportation
 standards jeopardize any current or future federal transportation funding.
- Has the BMV approved the use of the BlueIndy electric vehicles for use on the streets and highways, even though they have not been approved by the U.S. Department of Transportation?
 If yes, when was it approved, for how long, under what circumstances, and to what extent?

Please provide me with copies of any waivers or documentation with respect to the use of the BlueIndy vehicles on streets and highways. I'd respectfully like to request a response by September 5th, 2014.
