Commissioner David Ober,

I support the Duke Energy proposal for leasing solar energy systems to enable faster growth of renewable energy.

Bethlehern UCC was the first church in Southwest Indiana to install solar panels. Our 54.4 KW system produces approximately 70,000 kwh annually, providing 90% of our electrical needs and reducing our utility bills significantly. However, if solar leasing had been available, we would have installed our system sconer, and we would have installed a bigger system. Many churches in our area would like to follow Bethlehem's lead; however, the initial cost of solar energy s prohibitive to many congregations.

In addition, the previous church I served in Colorado also installed solar panels. These panels were leased, and our arrangement was a win-win for both the church and the lessor. Solar panels are much more prevalent in Colorado; many churches took advantage of this opportunity to reduce their utility costs.

As Vectren customers, we are interested in the Duke Energy proposal because a similar leasing program by Vectren could make afforclable energy more accessible to those non-profits with limited financial resources in Evansville.

We encourage the Commission to approve the proposed program. We appreciate your attention to our comments.
