I. INTRODUCTION AND PURPOSE OF TESTIMONY

- 2 Q. Please state your name, position and business address.
- 3 A. My name is Kerwin L. Olson, and I am the Executive Director of Citizens Action
- 4 Coalition of Indiana, Inc. ("CAC"). My business address is 1915 West 18th Street, Suite
- 5 C, Indianapolis, Indiana 46202.

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- 6 Q. Please describe your current responsibilities.
- 7 A. I have served as CAC's Executive Director since June of 2011. I am CAC's chief public 8 policy spokesperson and its chief operating officer and am responsible to its Board of 9 Directors for the overall program and operations management of the organization. Major 10 priorities are established by CAC's membership at its annual meetings and broad policies 11 are adopted by the Board of Directors at its quarterly meetings. I provide development, 12 supervision and coordination for the implementation of policies and programs based on 13 these priorities. My current responsibilities also include: issue and policy research, 14 lobbying at the Statehouse, legislative outreach and education, community and media 15 outreach, writing press releases, guest columns and op-ed columns, and community and 16 member organizing. I am also CAC's representative on the board of the Indiana Coalition 17 for Human Services and for other organizations and committees, and I supervise CAC's 18 participation on numerous energy efficiency and demand-side-management collaborative 19 oversight boards.
- 20 Q. Please briefly summarize your prior employment and educational background.
- A. I studied American History at the University of Chicago from 1986 to 1989. I joined the staff at CAC twelve years ago in 2005, working in member outreach. In 2006, I became CAC's Public Outreach Coordinator, served briefly as its Phone Canvass Director in

early 2008, and then served as CAC's Program Director from the beginning of April of 2 2008. My responsibilities included performing (and supervising others who performed) 3 research on energy and regulatory issues. I have been CAC's primary legislative liaison since 2008. I have served as Executive Director of CAC since June of 2011. I have 5 attended numerous workshops and seminars on energy, energy efficiency, low-income 6 and consumer issues, renewable energy, coal, coal gasification, carbon capture and 7 sequestration, biomass and bio-fuels, and nuclear energy.

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- 8 Have you previously filed testimony before the Indiana Utility Regulatory Q. 9 Commission ("IURC" or "Commission")?
 - I have testified before the Commission numerous times, including in Cause Nos. 43114 A. In addition, my duties require me to testify before several of the Indiana General Assembly's House and Senate committees and participate in panel discussions in public forums.

1 Q. On whose behalf are you testifying?

- 2 A. I am testifying on behalf of CAC, the Indiana Coalition for Human Services ("ICHS"),
- Indiana Community Action Association ("INCAA") and Sierra Club ("SC") (collectively,
- 4 "Joint Intervenors" or "JI").

5 Q. What is the purpose of your testimony in this proceeding?

6 My testimony supports Joint Intervenors' request for the Commission to deny A. 7 Indianapolis Power & Light Company's ("IPL" or the "Company") request to increase 8 the monthly service charge for low-use residential customers from \$11.25 to \$16.00 per 9 customer, and for higher-use customers, from \$17.00 to \$27.00. Instead, I urge the 10 Commission to adopt Mr. Wallach's alternative proposal: a fixed charge of \$8.15 and an 11 energy charge of (1) 12.4 ¢/kWh for the first 500 kWh, (2) 10.3 ¢/kWh for 500-1,000 12 kWh, and (3) 9.2 ¢/kWh for over 1,000 kWh (applicable to electric space and water heating customers only). I also support Mr. Howat's recommendation that IPL be 13 14 directed by the Commission to deliver high-usage, low-income customers with enhanced, 15 whole-house energy efficiency programming involving major appliance replacements, 16 distribution and installation of effective energy management equipment, substantial 17 building shell retrofits, and actionable energy education, rather than relying on the blunt 18 instrument of the Company's fixed customer charge to address the affordability issues 19 faced by the minority of low-income households that have high monthly usage.

20 Q. What did you do to prepare yourself to testify for this proceeding?

I reviewed most of the pre-filed direct testimony of IPL witnesses and the transcripts from the two field hearings conducted in this case. I have also spoken to multiple members of the public regarding the proposed rate increase.

1	Q.	Who will be testifying on behalf of Joint Intervenors in this proceeding?
2	A.	In addition to myself, below is a brief summary of the witnesses and the corresponding
3		subject matter:

o The purpose of JI Witness Howat's testimony is to (1) examine the federal poverty guidelines, data relative to income required by various family types to pay for basic necessities, and residential customer expenditure data to determine low-income challenges; (2) examine the U.S. Energy Information Administration's Residential Energy Consumption Survey data to determine the impact of the Company's proposal on certain populations; (3) respond to witness Gaske's use of LIHEAP data to support his assertions and arguments for increasing the fixed customer charge for all residential customers; and (4) recommend how the Commission and the Company should address bill impacts on those low-income customers with high usage.

II. FIELD HEARING TESTIMONY

Q. Did a representative for Joint Intervenors attend each of the three field hearings conducted in this proceeding?

Yes. Joint Intervenors attended and heard passionate testimony from IPL customers and community leaders about IPL's proposals in this general rate case. I personally attended both of the field hearings held at Arsenal Technical High School on April 23rd, 2018 and at New Augusta Public Academy-North on May 7, 2018. Out of a total of 57 individuals who testified at those field hearings, not one voiced support for IPL's proposed rate increase.

Concerns were expressed about the impact this request will have on fixed- and
low-income households by many, if not the majority, of those who spoke. Concerns were
also expressed related to the impact that IPL's continued use of fossil fuels will have on
climate change. Several witnesses voiced concerns over the fact that IPL is seeking a rate
increase while public schools and the community at-large have vast needs and pointed
out the increase in poverty that Marion County has realized in recent years. And several
witnesses expressed frustrations regarding the opaqueness of IPL's monthly bills and the
extensive advertising that IPL does, despite being a monopoly.

Q.

- Did individuals from agencies or organizations that provide poor relief or assistance to low-income households testify at the field hearings?
- Yes, there were many who work or volunteer at food banks, churches, or other nonprofits who provided testimony under oath.

I will highlight a few of these individuals including Heath Jones, the Pastor of Northwood Christian Church, who stated "When parents are strapped financially and are unable to pay their bills, the stress, anxiety, and fear that results impacts children to their very souls. All institutions and entities including power companies should hold on to this reality as they make decisions that will impact the lives of our children and their parents, not to mention the lives of the elderly on fixed incomes."

Sister Gail Trippett testified that "The number of people that are coming asking for assistance because their power is almost ready to be turned off or has been turned off is increasing on a daily basis. As I go through the list of agencies that I know are providing assistance, their response is I've already tried them, and so even with all of the agencies that are trying to currently help IPL customers who can't afford it now, I know that they're not going to be able to afford a rate increase."

Tamara Carr who works in a phone center at a large non-profit stated that "It really concerns me because all year, especially in the winter, I would get the calls for help. You know, their power is being turned off or it has been turned off for months. One lady comes to mind that had an autistic child. She had many issues with the spouse and a lot of violence and this, that, and the other, but it's just one of many that I heard from all year, and so as a help line person, I would refer her or call organizations to try to get someone to get her bill paid. The problem is in Indianapolis, the funds are dried up."³

Q. Did any other testimony prove especially compelling?

A. Yes, several customers provided testimony under oath. A mother told us that her "...child attends IPS School 74, and I see firsthand the proof that we have children who are food and housing insecure." A 67 year-old on social security testified and stated "I'm also a chronic cancer patient that has to focus on my medical costs, and when I saw the

increase, that increase or potential further increases will be higher than the increase to my Supplement F that I need to ensure that I get the medical care."⁵

A high-school senior shared that "my mom and I can't afford IPL's proposal. We deserve to afford our whole grocery shopping list, but so far we haven't been able to, and this rate increase will take more money out of our food budget."

Lastly, Dr. Daniel Hassumani spoke: "I am a pediatrician in Indianapolis. Just this winter, I had a family tell me they could not afford their medication because they had to decide between keeping their heat on or buying medication. The downstream effects of this are catastrophic."

Q. Is there any other testimony that should be highlighted for the Commission?

I would encourage everyone who was unable to attend one or more of the field hearings to review the attached transcripts, especially those individuals at the Commission working on this complicated case. On the Commission website, it states:

The Commission is a fact-finding body that hears evidence in cases filed before it and makes decisions based on the evidence presented in those cases. An advocate of neither the public nor the utilities, the IURC is required by state statute to make decisions that balance the interests of all parties to ensure the utilities provide adequate and reliable service at reasonable prices.⁸

I present these transcripts from the public field hearings as evidence for the Commission to consider in deciding this case. These were the voices of the rate-paying public—an entity with a substantial interest in this case and whose interests should be balanced with those of the utility, the large customers, the municipalities, and other intervenors in this proceeding. All have an interest in achieving a fair and balanced outcome.

As a consumer and a low-income advocate, I was moved by the testimony provided by the public. We heard from a State Representative, a City-County Councilor, single moms, teachers, pastors, veterans, seniors on fixed incomes, students, business owners, union workers, net-metering customers, and many others from various walks of life and professions. We heard of the struggles of seniors who are realizing minute increases in their social security checks, certainly not enough to offset this proposed rate increase -- most notably the increase in the monthly fixed charge.

As evidenced by these field hearings, the communities are doing their part to lift people up and improve vulnerable Hoosiers' quality of life through their congregations, social welfare organizations and other initiatives directing them to serve the poor. But large gaps remain, and more help is needed. The Commission is in a critically important position to help address those gaps.

III. OBSERVATIONS

14 Q. In general, what are the economic conditions in IPL's service territory?

A. The Sagamore Institute, a think tank headquartered in Indianapolis, recently released 16 their 2017 "Public Good Index." The report was highlighted in the Indianapolis Business 17 Journal ("IBJ") on October 21, 2017 in an article titled "Rise in poverty in Indy nearly outpaces growth in population over 15 years." The article summarized the findings, stating:

The bottom line of Sagamore's 2017 "Public Good Index" is sobering: The portion of Indianapolis residents living in poverty increased from 11.8 percent in 2000 to 21.3 percent in 2015—an increase of 85,063 people. That brought the total impoverished population to 175,623. To make matters worse, over the same 15-year period, the city population grew just 89,898.

Sagamore's study also found annual median household income in Indianapolis fell 2.4 percent from 2010 to 2015, from \$43,009 to \$41,987. And 30.7 percent of Indianapolis children were impoverished in 2015. 10

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On May 11, 2018, the IBJ published another alarming article entitled "1 in 5 Indianapolis residents lives in poverty. And many areas are getting worse." Among other findings, the article informed us that every zip code in Marion County, with the exception of one, has realized an increase in poverty from 2000 to 2016, and that twenty-three of Indianapolis' 36 zip codes have poverty levels above the national average.

Additionally, the 2016-2017 Fiscal Year¹² report from IN211¹³ informs us that of the over 30,000 people in households with vulnerable children who called IN211, utility assistance was their #1 need with 19,963¹⁴ of those calls asking specifically for electric bill payment assistance. To make matters worse, 1.661¹⁵ of those 19.963 were marked as "unmet needs," meaning electric bill payment assistance was the largest unmet need for IN211 callers with vulnerable children in the household.



1 Q. What is the state of IPL's general residential customers?

On April 2, 2018, the Company filed their 2017 Annual Performance Metrics Report¹⁶ 2 A. 3 with the Commission, which showed that, on average, 15-20% of IPL's residential customer accounts are in arrears on a monthly basis. 4

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It is alarming that so many customers on a monthly basis cannot afford their electric bills and, in my opinion, clearly displays that many of IPL's customers are struggling to afford the basic necessities of life, like electricity, and that there is an overall affordability problem among IPL's residential class.

- Q. Is there any other data from the IPL 2017 Annual Performance Metrics Report that should be brought to the attention of the Commission to consider in this proceeding?
- Yes. Figure 19 in the report presents the number of IPL customers who experience a loss of electric service due to disconnection by the Company.

The number of customers disconnected for non-payment during the winter is significantly less than other months. This is due to the winter moratorium (Indiana Code § 8-1-2-121) reducing the number of disconnects during weather extremes.

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There is a disturbing uptick in disconnections from 2016 to 2017, which raises serious concerns regarding the health, safety, and overall quality of life for the nearly 60,000 residential customers who experienced the loss of electric service during the year 2017. Additionally, this data could be an indicator that the affordability problem with IPL's residential class is growing.

The Commission should also consider the fact that IPL has been slowly deploying smart meters, or advanced metering infrastructure, in their service territory. CAC has raised concerns regarding the capability of smart meters to enable utility companies to remotely disconnect customers. We fear that this capability will make the disconnection of service too easy for IPL and other electric utilities in Indiana, and may lead to an

increase in the number of households experiencing more frequent interruptions in their electric service. In discovery, we asked the Company to "Please explain whether the installation of smart meters in IPL's service territory any influence on the increase of disconnects from 2016 to 2017." The Company responded with:

It is reasonable to attribute some efficiencies in the reconnect and disconnect process due to advanced metering infrastructure.¹⁷

First, I would urge the Commission to begin an investigation or a rule-making to look into the current Commission rules regarding disconnection protections for consumers and update those to reflect the capabilities of smart meters to ensure that adequate protections are in place for customers, most especially households with vulnerable children, disabled family members, and medically fragile individuals who could suffer catastrophic consequences if access to electric service was interrupted.

Second, I recommend the Commission order IPL to begin a collaborative process after the issuance of an order in this case to create a comprehensive electricity affordability program which would embrace the following principles:

- serves LIHEAP-eligible residential electricity customers at or below 150% of the federal poverty level,
- o lowers program participants' electricity burdens to an affordable level,
- o promotes regular, timely payment of electric bills by program participants,
- o comprehensively addresses payment problems associated with program participants' current and past-due bills,
- o is funded through a mechanism that is predictable while providing sufficient resources to meet policy objectives over an extended timeframe,
- o is paid for by all classes of electricity customers, and
- o is administered efficiently and effectively.

We strongly believe that a comprehensive electricity program is necessary to ensure that all of IPL's customer have uninterrupted access to what is an essential human service necessary to ensure dignity and quality of life, and to protect the comfort, health, and

safety of the most vulnerable among us. This program should include not only a low-income rate class which provides discounts to LIHEAP-eligible households, but also an arrearage management program to assist customers with the barriers that come with large past-due balances that they cannot afford to pay in full. If they cannot stay current on their monthly bills, it is unreasonable to expect these struggling households to have the means to pay past due balances that they could not afford when they were due.

A sustainable electricity affordability program with defined benefit levels and participation rates requires funding that is predictable and reliable. The most predictable, reliable source of funding for a sustainable electricity affordability program would come from a non-bypassable charge on monthly electric bills to all classes of customers.

Q. Didn't IPL propose a low-income assistance program in this proceeding?

In the direct testimony of Rafael Sanchez, which has since been adopted by Craig Jackson, there is recognition that some of IPL's customers "face economic challenges and have difficulty paying their bills." The testimony continues and states that IPL will be developing a bill round-up program to assist customers facing bill payment problems. We applaud the Company for recognizing the payment difficulties many of their customers face and for proposing something to provide assistance. However, to the best of my knowledge, the program is still not developed, and the details are unclear. We sincerely appreciate the dialogue we have had with the Company about the development of this program and hope this dialogue continues and a round-up program materializes soon. Such a voluntary bill round-up program should use an "opt-out" feature so as to enroll all customers, but then allow the ability of customers to opt-out, should they lack the desire to contribute to this worthwhile program. This would be a similar design to the

- opt-out provisions for industrial customers related to participation in ratepayer-funded

 DSM programs.
- 3 IV. CONCLUSIONS
- 4 Q. What are your recommendations?
- 5 A. I recommend that the Commission reject the Company's residential rate design proposed 6 in its direct case-in-chief. Instead, the Commission should adopt JI Witness Wallach's alternative proposal: a fixed charge of \$8.15 and an volumetric energy charge of (1) 12.4 7 ¢/kWh for the first 500 kWh, (2) 10.3 ¢/kWh for 500-1,000 kWh, and (3) 9.2 ¢/kWh for 8 9 over 1,000 kWh (applicable to RH and RC customers only). I recommend the 10 Commission order IPL to begin a low-income rate class with an arrearage management 11 component; however, in the alternative, the Commission should order a collaborative 12 process for the design of the Company's proposed voluntary bill round-up program, 13 which should embrace the opt-out program design, rather than an opt-in program design.
- 14 Q. Does this conclude your testimony?
- 15 A. Yes.



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

- 25 what IPL is doing. Yes, there are programs for families

- 1 that are in need, but those programs have to get funds and
- 2 resources from somewhere. Indianapolis has over 200 food
- 3 pantries; let that sink in.
- 4 IPL has no right to take advantage of this city
- 5 with this rate increase. It feels very excessive. Our
- 6 public schools who rely on government funding aren't well
- 7 funded enough to keep programs alive for our special needs
- 8 kids. Our city is not able to keep programs like the Boys
- 9 and Girls Club of Indianapolis well funded. The Keenan
- 10 Stahl Boys & Girls Club has to shut down several days a
- 11 month due to funding. If the organizations that are put
- 12 into place to serve our children are struggling, then IPL
- 13 should not be asking for more money. Put our children and
- 14 my students first.
- My fourth point, and this comes from me as being
- 16 a real person, is the feel good IPL commercial that airs on
- 17 local TV for 200 to 1500 per showing, and that's just to
- 18 show one commercial. That doesn't add in how much it costs
- 19 to produce the commercial. The commercial starts out we
- 20 are more than power and light; we are real people. This is
- 21 what IPL's commercial states in their 30 second ad. It
- 22 shows real people named Barbara, Brandy, Mike, and Claire.
- 23 They are happy, smiling, and working members of the
- 24 community. The commercial also states that IPL volunteers
- 25 in the community. According to their website, they support

- 1 Gleaners Food Bank of Indiana, Black Expo, Trees for
- 2 Tomorrow, and Project GreenSpace. They also support the
- 3 variety of parades that Indy has each year.
- 4 Why does IPL need a 30 second commercial? Is it
- 5 to persuade residents of Indy to choose to use IPL for an
- 6 electricity provider? No. Residents of Indy do not get
- 7 that choice. Residents in Indy do not have any choice in
- 8 who provides the electricity to their homes and small
- 9 businesses. However, watching the commercial makes me feel
- 10 like IPL is a great asset to the community and must be
- 11 doing quite well. They can afford to create and pay for
- 12 this feel good ad, right, because residents do not get to
- 13 choose the electricity provider.
- 14 Parades, Black Expo, all of those things that
- 15 bring tourists and help boost our city's economy, awesome;
- 16 I love the 500 parade. I think I will choose to buy my
- 17 electricity from IPL since it's a premiere sponsor. Oh,
- 18 wait. I don't have that choice.
- 19 Trees and green space. I bet IPL is doing
- 20 everything they can to save our environment. Don't
- 21 encourage me. I am all for the environment. In fact, at
- 22 my house, we even named my seven-year old the official
- 23 light turner outer. It is his job to make sure TVs and
- 24 lights are turned off. He does an excellent job, too.
- 25 However, I am not really believing that IPL truly

- 1 is doing everything for our environment. The coal ash
- 2 ponds are leaking into the groundwater on Indy's south
- 3 side. According to superpolluters.com, in 2014, it spewed
- 4 out more toxic air pollution than any other Hoosier power
- 5 plant. According to the federal Toxics Release Inventory,
- 6 in 2015, it ranked second among Indiana power plants behind
- 7 Duke Energy's Gibson plant. It's the third largest carbon
- 8 polluting power plant in Indiana with 9.3 million metric
- 9 tons of greenhouse gasses in 2015.
- 10 It has also been cited for serious Clean Air Act
- 11 violations by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency
- 12 which says IPL updated the plant multiple times over 23
- 13 years without adding the most modern pollution controls.
- 14 U.S. EPA alleges that IPL has operated the plant in
- 15 violation of the law causing an increase of dangerous air
- 16 pollution and unhealthy levels of soot which contributes to
- 17 respiratory disease, lung damage, and premature deaths.
- 18 I understand that IPL wants to fix these issues,
- 19 and there are a plethora of environmental arguments, which
- 20 is a whole other topic, but these plants need to be fixed
- 21 without creating more poverty in the city.
- I am here today to inform the community of what
- 23 it is like to be a real person. I want the community to
- 24 understand and grasp exactly what it means to not have a
- 25 choice and to see through the feel good commercial. We all

- 1 want cleaner energy; we all want that renewable energy
- 2 source. We need solar rays and less fossil fuel. IPL
- 3 should take their advertisement money and the feel good
- 4 money and budget and save just like the rest of us real
- 5 people.
- 6 My personal advice to Mr. Zagzebski and
- 7 Mr. Jackson is to learn how to budget IPL money in a more
- 8 cost-effective way. I am sure with your \$400,000 salary
- 9 and bonuses you aren't standing in a food pantry line in
- 10 order to feed your children. Think about how much you
- 11 could fix if you cut back salaries and bonuses, and quit
- 12 throwing money away on ads.
- 13 Mr. Jackson, please step into the shoes of a
- 14 standard IPL customer and think budget reduction and not
- 15 frivolous spending. Your high salaried way of thinking is
- 16 hurting the rest of us.
- 17 Please, Mr. Zagzebski and Mr. Jackson, start the
- 18 process of finding renewable cost-effective energy. Please
- 19 stop taking advantage of the citizens, eliminate
- 20 advertisements, cut back on the ridiculous PR moves, and
- 21 maybe if you truly do want to make a difference in this
- 22 city, donate your extreme bonuses to public education,
- 23 working class families, and IPL renewable energy instead of
- 24 front row tickets to sold out concerts and sporting events.
- Take your rightful place in line behind public

             Let me remind the Commission and the audience of
20 some facts that previous speakers have mentioned. One is
21 that the economic condition of the average resident of
22 Indianapolis is deteriorating. According to the most
23 reliable statistics, the poverty rate -- the incidents of
24 poverty increased from 11.8 percent in 2000 to 21.3 percent
25 in 2015. That's probably due to the financial crises of
                                                  FH-A-16
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- 1 2008 for the most part, and that includes 30 percent of
- 2 children, and as a previous speaker has reminded us and as
- 3 everybody knows, IPL is a monopoly. Unless you can afford
- 4 to invest a great deal of money and switch into solar
- 5 power, you have no choice as to where you get your
- 6 electricity. The average income for the residents of
- 7 Indianapolis declined from \$43,000 annually in 2010 to
- 8 42,000 in 2015.
- 9 Now by contrast, IPL's rate increases have -- for
- 10 the past ten years have averaged 45 percent. Now that is
- 11 way, way ahead of the inflation rate. The inflation has
- 12 not been 4.5 percent annually for the last ten years, so
- 13 IPL is receiving money at a rate far ahead of inflation,
- 14 and the income, as mentioned, for the average resident of
- 15 Indianapolis has declined by 8 percent over the same
- 16 period. Wages are stagnant. The cost of energy, food,
- 17 health, utilities, and other necessities has increased
- 18 steadily, though, so there is an intent squeeze, but I can
- 19 attest myself personally because I am a retired person. I
- 20 live on social security and a small annuity, so I would
- 21 have a serious problem in remaining in our house. A lot of
- 22 people would have to move out of their houses if this rate
- 23 increase were passed.
- One of the most egregious components of IPL's --
- 25 Can you hear me all right? I'm sorry. How's this? Okay.

- One of the most -- Would you like me to repeat
- 2 anything I said before? Would the Reporter like me to
- 3 repeat anything I've said before so that -- Will that help?
- 4 Okay, thank you.
- 5 One of the most egregious components of IPL's
- 6 request is the increase in monthly fixed charges from 17 to
- 7 \$27.00. These are grossly inequitable and grossly unfair
- 8 because they disproportionately hit people with -- who have
- 9 fixed incomes. They are also anti-competitive. They
- 10 reduce the economic incentive to conserve energy and invest
- 11 in energy efficiency because the utility in effect takes a
- 12 portion of your bill savings to pad and protect it towards
- 13 its profits.
- Now what about those profits? Well, we know that
- 15 IPL's free cash flow after meeting all of its expenses last
- 16 year was \$2 billion, not 200 million but \$2 billion. That
- 17 is basically free and clear; that's after paying its
- 18 executive bonuses, after installing plush carpeting in its
- 19 corporate suites, after paying for its advertising, and
- 20 what is it doing with that \$2 billion?
- 21 Well, one thing it's not doing is being proactive
- 22 in its maintenance of its underground grid in the city
- 23 streets, installed protective barriers to stop -- finally
- 24 to stop the explosions of manhole covers. It does not do
- 25 preventative maintenance. It's protecting people

- 1 supposedly on the surface from these explosions, but it has
- 2 not done anything to prevent them in the first place.
- 3 It also lobbied very aggressively in the State
- 4 Legislature recently to reduce the incentive for homeowners
- 5 to switch to solar power. Obviously, it doesn't want to
- 6 lose customers; it wants to have a captive customer base
- 7 that it can squeeze as hard as possible.
- 8 So this leads me to circle back to a reference
- 9 that I believe Judge Drake made in describing the mission
- 10 of the IURC which is to ensure that utilities are able to
- 11 assess a just and reasonable rate to their customers. I
- 12 believe the overwhelming weight of evidence suggests that
- 13 IPL's request would afford it an unjust and an unreasonable
- 14 rate of compensation from the customers.
- On top of that IPL, like other corporations, is
- 16 benefiting from a sharp reduction in the corporate tax
- 17 rate, as the previous speaker mentioned, from 35 percent to
- 18 21 percent, so it's free and clear for the next year. It's
- 19 not going to be less than it is this year; it's going to be
- 20 more with or without this rate increase.
- 21 This rate increase is superfluous. It is, in
- 22 fact, I would contend an act of class warfare against the
- 23 people of Indianapolis. It is a wanton assault on IPL's
- 24 customers. It has ample revenue available to meet the
- 25 expenses associated with completing the projects that Judge

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1 Drake listed in her opening statement, so I believe it's

             There are families in my church that have lost

11 these high utility bills, too, sometimes with five or six
12 kids who go to school and wouldn't think of taking a job
13 because they're there to support their families. These
14 people need to be protected and honored and valued as part

             I see the rate increase as more than deplorable,
17 especially with the corporate tax cut that so many of these
18 large companies have received here in Indiana and

We actually feel the pain of the people 3 in the community where the salaries remain the same but the 4 bills are constantly increasing. We're always getting 5 requests for more money, but when we ask a not-for- profit 6 organization or the community asks for donations or for the 7 companies -- large companies like IPL to support some of 8 our not-for-profit causes free of charge, we're denied; 9 they don't know us, and that's okay. So that means that we 10 have to resort to other measures to support each other and 11 look out for each other. 12 The area where I serve, we now have a food 13 pantry. Do you think any of them donated \$10,000 to the 14 area? I live at 1044 West 37th Street in the old 15 [inaudible] area for some of you that are familiar with 16 that. It's right there at 30th and Clifton, and what they 17 fail to realize is when they start asking for more money, 18 and the seniors and myself can't truly afford it, that's an 19 endangerment. We're talking about crime, and it's only 20 going to increase, and then all of a sudden, we have the 21 opioids because there's drugs out there, but when it was 22 hitting us, the less fortunate, but than the Fortune 500 23 group, it became an epidemic, these opioids, and they saw 24 money coming from the feds and everywhere else. 25 failed to realize there's such a thing as prevention, not

- 1 intervention, and they talk about being active. No, that's
- 2 after the fact, and there is so much that is going on and
- 3 so much that I could actually say, but I'm not going to
- 4 spend all the time.
- I am saying one thing, when was the last time
- 6 that any of you all sitting up there received a reward from
- 7 IPL, let alone the community? Most of those, we don't even

- 14 call one of the t.v. stations to find out that information,
- 15 and I would like to ask that when these things take place,
- 16 that weeks in advance that that be made available to the
- 17 community because then we may have this auditorium more
- 18 full.
- 19 Trying to find the financial information about
- 20 IPL also was not readily available. IPL is anything but
- 21 transparent. What I have found out, though, is that their
- 22 parent company, ASE [sic], did, and we've heard it tonight,
- 23 profit over \$2 billion last year alone. Craig Jackson's
- 24 annual income \$186,000 plus bonuses. Kenneth -- I'm going
- 25 to slaughter his last name so I'm not even going to try --

- 1 \$400,000 from IPL. Now, he wears many other hats as well,
- 2 and his total income from what I've been able to find out
- 3 is about \$1.3 million, and I think that bonuses may be
- 4 included on top of that. These individuals have no idea
- 5 how people out here who work for a living struggle to make
- 6 their house payments, to pay their utilities, just the
- 7 necessities of life, let alone before we get to the wants
- 8 of life, of stopping and getting a hamburger, going to a
- 9 movie. You still gotta buy clothes; you still gotta have
- 10 shoes, but we also gotta have electricity.
- 11 IPL does have a program where they try to get
- 12 people to conserve on the utility usage that they send out
- 13 this package with these fluorescent bulbs. Those
- 14 fluorescent bulbs contain mercury, and so when they break,
- 15 mercury is being released in our atmosphere. It's a hazard
- 16 to us. Those packages need to be taken away. I personally
- 17 replaced every single lightbulb in my house with LEDs, and
- 18 my personal light bill went down 25 percent.
- 19 Rather than doing something that's going to be
- 20 harmful to our environment, they need to promote something
- 21 that is going to be helpful, and that would be the LEDs.
- 22 That way they don't have to spend the money to generate as
- 23 much power. They can save money there; consumers save
- 24 money, and it's more of a win-win to everybody.
- Now, that initial cost to myself for my household FH-B-32

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1 was about 100 to $125. It took me three months to recoup
 2 that in my light bill itself, but after that short period
 3 of time, I had a savings.
            I think that IPL needs to look at what they're
 5 doing with their huge budget, find out what kind of
 6 investment they can make with these $2 billion a year that
 7 they're making, and figure out a way to lower their costs
 8 to save money which may even increase their bottom line
 9 even more, and the people don't have to pay for it.
             IPL and ASE [sic] I believe did just get a major

11 tax break, and so the 10 percent that they're wanting to go

21 chlorophyll in the classroom and noticed that if I applied
22 different metals to the -- as electrode positive and
23 negative, I would generate electricity with light, and the
24 judge of the science project said I basically built a solar
25 panel, so I have been very interested in solar panels.
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1
             In 1971, they were very expensive, maybe 1,000
 2 times per kilowatt hour of the cost of building a coal
 3 plant, but last year the SB 309 Bill essentially was trying
 4 to outlaw me creating my own power unless I had a special
 5 permit, so I went through the process of getting solar
 6 panels on my house. August 16th, they went on line, and
 7 I'm generating enough electricity to power my house, my
 8 electric car, and a second electric car and looking at
 9 getting a third electric car. I've got enough solar panels
10 I can go off grid if I wanted to. I'm one of the few net
11 metering customers that Joey Myles mentioned earlier.
            This rate increase, as I said, doesn't affect me
12
13 other than the fact that my only bill is to be attached to
14 the grid. It's $12.09 a month for me to be attached to the
15 grid and use the grid as a battery for my surplus energy to
16 go on to the grid or come back off the grid when I am not
17 producing solar energy. I've got two electric cars.
18 got plenty of storage capacity. If I ever have an outage,
19 I can provide power for my house, and with this rate
20 increase, I could actually go off the grid if it weren't
21 for politics as I cannot be a resident of Marion County and
22 not be attached to the grid if I own a house. I own a
23 house, and I could be detached from the grid.



Reduced Incentives for Energy Efficiency and Distributed Generation

Reduced Incentives for Energy Efficiency and Distributed Generation Energy efficiency and clean distributed generation are widely viewed as important tools for helping reduce energy costs, decrease greenhouse gas emissions, create jobs, and improve economic competitiveness. Currently, ratepayer-funded energy efficiency programs are operating in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.17 These efficiency programs exist alongside numerous other government policies, including building codes and appliance standards, federal weatherization assistance, and tax incentives. Distributed generation (such as rooftop solar) is commonly supported through tax incentives and net energy metering programs that compensate customers who generate a portion of their own electricity.

Increasing fixed charges can significantly reduce incentives for customers to reduce consumption through energy efficiency, distributed generation, or other means. By reducing the value of a kilowatthour saved or self-generated, a higher fixed charge directly reduces the incentive that customers have to lower their bills by reducing consumption. Customers who are considering making investments in energy efficiency measures or distributed generation will have longer payback periods over which to recoup their initial investment. In some cases, a customer might never break even financially when the fixed charge is increased. Increasing the fixed charge also penalizes customers who have already taken steps to reduce their energy consumption by implementing energy efficiency measures or installing distributed generation.

"When has it ever been the right of a company under any ethical business practices to penalize their customers for being efficient, conservative and environmentally responsible?"




Figure 9. Rooftop solar payback period under various customer charges

Figure 9 illustrates how the payback period for rooftop solar can change under a net metering mechanism with different fixed charges. Under net metering arrangements, a customer can offset his or her monthly electricity usage by generating solar electricity—essentially being compensated for each kilowatt-hour produced. However, solar customers typically cannot avoid the fixed charge. For a fairly typical residential customer, raising the fixed charge from \$9.00 per month to \$25.00 per month could change the payback period for a 5 kW rooftop solar system from 19 years to 23 years—longer than the expected lifetime of the equipment. Increasing the fixed charge to \$50.00 per month further exacerbates the situation, causing the project to not break even until 37 years in the future, and virtually guaranteeing that customers with distributed generation will face a significant financial loss.

All three scenarios assume monthly consumption of 850 kWh. The 59.00 per month fixed charge assumes a corresponding energy charge of 10.36 cents per kWh, while the 525 fixed charge assumes an energy charge of 8.48 cents per kWh, and the 550 fixed charge assumes an energy charge of 5.54 cents per kWh.

In Connecticut, customers decried the proposed fixed charge as profoundly unfair: "When has it ever been the right of a company under any ethical business practices to penalize their customers for being efficient, conservative and environmentally responsible?" noted one frustrated customer. "Where is the incentive to spend hard-earned money to improve your appliances, or better insulate your home or more efficiently set your thermostats or air conditioning not to be wasteful, trying to conserve energy for the next generation - when you will allow the utility company to just turn around and now charge an additional fee to offset your savings?"18

Increased Electricity System Costs

High fixed charges may actually encourage customers to leave the system, leaving fewer and fewer customers to shoulder the costs of the electric system.

Because higher fixed charges reduce customer incentives to reduce consumption, they will undermine regulatory policies and programs that promote energy efficiency and clean distributed generation, leading to higher program costs, diminished results, or both. Rate design influences the effectiveness of these regulatory policies by changing the price signals that customers see. Holding all else equal, if the fixed charge is increased, the energy charge (cents per kilowatt-hour) will be reduced, thereby lowering the value of a kilowatt-hour conserved or generated by a customer.

The flip side of this is that customers may actually increase their energy consumption since they perceive the electricity to be cheaper. Under such a scenario, states will have to spend more funds on incentives to achieve the same level of energy efficiency savings and to encourage the same amount of distributed generation as achieved previously at a lower cost. Where electricity demand is not

effectively reduced, utilities will eventually need to invest in new power plants, power lines, and substations, thereby raising electricity costs for all customers.

High fixed charges may actually encourage customers to leave the system, leaving fewer and fewer customers to shoulder the costs of the electric system.

In extreme cases, high fixed charges may actually encourage customers to leave the system. As rooftop solar and storage costs continue to fall, some customers may find it less expensive to generate all of their own electricity without relying on the utility at all. Once a customer departs the system, the total system costs must be redistributed among the remaining customers, raising electricity rates. These higher rates may then lead to more customers defecting, leaving fewer and fewer customers to shoulder the costs.

The end result of having rate design compete with public policy incentives is that customers will pay more—either due to higher energy efficiency and distributed generation program costs, or through more investments needed to meet higher electricity demand. Meanwhile, customers who have already invested in energy efficiency or distributed generation will get burned by the reduced value of their investments and may choose to leave the grid, while low-income customers will experience higher bills, and all customers will have fewer options for reducing their electricity bills.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Recently, there has been a sharp increase in the number of utilities proposing to recover more of their costs through mandatory monthly fixed charges rather than through rates based on usage. Utilities prefer to collect revenue through fixed charges because the fixed charge reduces the utility's risk that lower sales (from energy efficiency, distributed generation, weather, or economic downturns) will reduce its revenues.

However, higher fixed charges are an inequitable and inefficient means to address utility revenue concerns. This report provides an overview of (a) how increased fixed charges can harm customers, (b) the common arguments that are used to support increased fixed charges, (c) recent commission decisions on fixed charges, and (d) alternative approaches, including maintaining the status quo when there is no serious threat to utility revenues.




Figure ES 1. Recent proposals and decisions regarding fixed charges

Fixed Charges Harm Customers

Reduced Customer Control. Since customers must pay the fixed charge regardless of how much electricity they consume or generate, the fixed charges reduce the ability of customers to lower their bills by consuming less energy.

Low-Usage Customers Hit Hardest. Customers who use less energy than average will experience the greatest percentage jump in their electric bills when the fixed charge is raised. There are many reasons a

customer might have low energy usage: they may be very conscientious to avoid wasting energy; they may simply be located in apartments or dense housing units that require less energy; they may have small families or live alone; or they may have energy-efficient appliances or solar panels.

Disproportionate Impacts on Low-Income Customers. Data from the Energy Information Administration show that in nearly every state, low-income customers consume less electricity than other residential customers, on average. Because fixed charges tend to increase bills for low-usage customers while decreasing them for high-use customers, fixed charges raise bills most for those who can least afford the increase.

Reduced Incentives for Energy Efficiency and Distributed Generation. By reducing the value of a kilowatt-hour saved or self-generated, a higher fixed charge directly reduces the incentive that customers have to invest in energy efficiency or distributed generation. Customers who have already invested in energy efficiency or distributed generation will be harmed by the reduced value of their investments.

Increased Electricity System Costs. Holding all else equal, if the fixed charge is increased, the energy charge (cents per kilowatt-hour) will be reduced, thereby lowering the value of a kilowatt-hour conserved or generated by a customer. With little incentive to save, customers may actually increase their energy consumption and states will have to spend more to achieve the same levels of energy efficiency savings and distributed generation. Where electricity demand rises, utilities will need to invest in new power plants, power lines, and substations, thereby raising electricity costs for all customers.

Common Myths Supporting Fixed Charges

"Most utility costs are fixed." In accounting, fixed costs are those expenses that remain the same for a utility over the short and medium term regardless of the amount of energy its customers consume. Economics generally takes a longer-term perspective, in which very few costs are fixed. This perspective focuses on efficient investment decisions over the long-term planning horizon. Over this timeframe, most costs are variable, and customer decisions regarding their electricity consumption can influence the need to invest in power plants, transmission lines, and other utility infrastructure. This longer-term perspective is what is relevant for economically efficient price signals, and should be used to inform rate setting.

"Fixed costs are unavoidable." Rates are designed so that the utility can recover past expenditures (sunk costs) in the future. Utilities correctly argue that these sunk costs have already been made and are unavoidable. However, utilities should not, and generally do not, make decisions based on sunk costs; rather, they make investment decisions on a forward-looking basis. Similarly, rate structures should be based on forward-going costs to ensure that customers are being sent the right price signals, as customer consumption will drive future utility investments.

"The fixed charge should recover distribution costs." Much of the distribution system is sized to meet customer maximum demand – the maximum power consumed at any one time. For customer classes

without a demand charge (such as residential customers), ¹ utilities have argued that these distribution costs should be recovered through the fixed charge. This would allocate the costs of the distribution system equally among residential customers, instead of according to how much energy a customer uses. However, customers do not place equal demands on the system – customers who use more energy also tend to have higher demands. While energy usage (kWh) is not a perfect proxy for demand (kW), collecting demand-related costs through the energy charge is far superior to collecting demand-related costs through the fixed charge.

"Cost-of-service studies should dictate rate design." Cost-of-service studies are used to allocate a utility's costs among the various customer classes. These studies can serve as useful guideposts or benchmarks when setting rates, but the results of these studies should not be directly translated into rates. Embedded cost-of-service studies allocate historical costs to different classes of customers. However, to provide efficient price signals, prices should be designed to reflect future marginal costs. Rate designs other than fixed charges may yield the same revenue for the utility while also accomplishing other policy objectives, such as sending efficient price signals.

"Low-usage customers are not paying their fair share." This argument is usually untrue. As noted above, distribution costs are largely driven by peak demands, which are highly correlated with energy usage. Further, many low-usage customers live in multi-family housing or in dense neighborhoods, and therefore impose lower distribution costs on the utility system than high-usage customers.

"Fixed charges are necessary to mitigate cost-shifting caused by distributed generation." Concerns about potential cost-shifting from distributed generation resources, such as rooftop solar, are often dramatically overstated. While it is true that a host distributed generation customer provides less revenue to the utility than it did prior to installing the distributed generation, it is also true that the host customer provides the utility with a source of very low-cost power. This power is often provided to the system during periods when demand is highest and energy is most valuable, such as hot summer afternoons when the sun is out in full force. The energy from the distributed generation resource allows the utility to avoid the costs of generating, transmitting, and distributing electricity from its power plants. These avoided costs will put downward pressure on electricity rates, which will significantly reduce or completely offset the upward pressure on rates created by the reduced revenues from the host customer.

Recent Commission Decisions on Fixed Charges

Commissions in many states have recently rejected utility proposals to increase mandatory fixed charges. These proposals have been rejected on several grounds, including that increased fixed charges

There are several reasons that demand charges are rarely assessed for residential customers. These reasons include the fact that demand charges introduce complexity into rates that may be inappropriate for residential customers; residential customers often lack the ability to monitor and respond to demand charges; and that residential customers often do not have more expensive meters capable of measuring customer demand.

will reduce customer control, send inefficient prices signals, reduce customer incentives to invest in energy efficiency, and have inequitable impacts on low-usage and low-income customers.

Several states have allowed utilities to increase fixed charges, but typically to a much smaller degree than has been requested by utilities. In addition, there have been many recent rate case settlements in which the utility proposal to increase fixed charges has been rejected by the settling parties.

Nevertheless, utilities continue to propose higher fixed charges, as any increase in the fixed charge helps to protect the utility from lower revenues associated with reduced sales, whether due to energy efficiency, distributed generation, or any other reason.

Alternatives to Fixed Charges

For most utilities, there is no need for increased fixed charges. Regulators who decide there is a need to address utility revenue sufficiency and volatility concerns should consider alternatives to increased fixed charges, such as minimum bills and time-of-use rates.





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

IPL Rate Case (IURC Cause No. 45029)
May 7, 2018 Hearing
Comments by Ben Inskeep (IPL residential customer)

My name is Ben Inskeep, and I am a residential customer of IPL. I am here to respectfully request that the IURC <u>deny</u> IPL's request to increase our electric rates.

While I ask that IPL's entire request be denied in full, I wish to focus my testimony today on one particular aspect of their request that I, along with many other Hoosier families, find especially repugnant: namely, IPL's proposal to increase the residential customer charge to \$27 per month.

I ask in particular that you reject IPL's request to increase the residential customer charge because it is already the highest customer charge among investor-owned utilities in Indiana and in neighboring states. In fact, if the Commission grants IPL's requested increase in full, we will have the most expensive customer charge in the nation among all major investor-owned utilities. I have attached to my testimony today a table of 165 utility fixed charges that were in effective at the time the analysis was completed in the fall of 2017. The table shows that currently the highest residential fixed charge in the country at an investor-owned utility is \$25 per month, and that the average is less than \$11 per month.

In addition to avoiding the dubious distinction of having the most expensive fixed charge in the nation, there are four key reasons why the Commission should reject IPL's request to increase the fixed charge.

First, higher fixed customer charges reduce customer control and disempower consumers. With higher fixed charges, the only way to avoid the fixed charge is to stop being a utility customer, which isn't realistic for most Hoosiers.

Second, low-usage customers are the hardest hit when fixed charges rise. IPL's own testimony shows this exact phenomenon – the less energy an IPL customer uses, the higher the percentage rate increase they will experience under IPL's proposal. For example, according to IPL's own filing in this case, millionaires living in massive mansions on Geist that use 7,000 kWh per month will only get hit with a 6% bill increase. Meanwhile those of us in more modest houses or apartments using 800 kWh per month, for example, get hit with a 14% rate hike.

This underscores my third point – low-income customers are disproportionately affected by hikes to fixed charges, as they tend to be low-usage customers. If you grant IPL's request, you will be increasing the bills of those who can least afford it.

Finally, it is important that our state continues to take advantage of the benefits of energy efficiency and distributed generation. Increasing the fixed charge component means families will have longer payback periods over which to recoup their initial investment on clean energy solutions, from LED lightbulbs to rooftop solar.

In conclusion, I urge the Commission to deny IPL's request. If anything, I ask that you consider <u>lowering</u> the customer charge back to where it used to be just a couple years ago at \$11 per month, which is very close to the national average.

I also ask that the Commission consider opening a "utility of the future" or similar type of proceeding, like we have seen in other Midwestern states, including Ohio, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, and Pennsylvania. This is a common sense approach for engaging stakeholders in important, current issues that include things like rate design, new technology deployment, and utility business models for the 21st century.



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



So I would come back to 10 you and say, break down your deliberations, break down what 11 you think is reasonable. The one thing I am absolutely 12 confident of is that the rate increase will be carried 13 mostly by the residential customers on their backs. 14 I've had people from 26 states call me at home 15 saying, how do you do this, how do you do that, on 16 vegetation management. I found out the reason they were 17 doing this is people at FERC were constantly giving my name 18 out, but the thing I would tell the people and I would say 19 to the folks in the audience here today, you must educate 20 the members of the Commission, the members of the OUCC, on 21 how it is going to impact you as a family and the 22 community.
- I know what would be more reasonable for you to 24 consider is some kind of a two- or three-tier approach to 25 this. You've got to think of the fact that so many people FH-D- 6

- 1 in the IPL territory are not very well-to-do folks. Yes,
- 2 there are some, but there are for very few well-to-do
- 3 people. There is probably 13 to 20 who are struggling
- 4 month to month on their bills, and so a substantial rate
- ${\bf 5}$ increase that falls on their shoulders is going to hurt a
- 6 lot.
- 7 I understand that their effective gross income
- 8 hasn't gone up that much over the last several years, and
- 9 that's tough on all of us. I can say that for myself, I

       I reside in Center Township at 545 East 11th. I am
20 going to be making some remarks both as an individual IPL
21 customer who made it in under the wire as a new solar PV
22 homeowner with the net metering before the end of 2017, and
23 this is on a 115-year old house in Center Township.
            Some of the personal issues -- I also want to
24
25 indicate I am a member of the Solar Energy Industries

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- 1 Association and an individual member of the American Solar
- 2 Energy Society as well.
- 3 As an IPL customer, I am concerned that after
- 4 several conversations with IPL employees, some of whom are
- 5 here in the room tonight, I have expressed my personal
- 6 request to have documentation of the grandfathering of
- 7 30 years that I'm entitled to as a result of Senate
- 8 Enrolled Act 309. I realize that the Commission has punted
- 9 on that issue and has decided not to require the utilities
- 10 to update their tariffs to reflect those changes. I'm
- 11 intimately familiar with that; however, I did have some
- 12 indication that IPL was interested and willing to do this
- 13 voluntarily. There are currently 171 net metering
- 14 customers in the service territory, 74 new net metering
- 15 customers as of the end of 2017.
- Let me explain the situation for me personally.
- 17 I may not look like it, but I'm on Medicare, fans. I
- 18 turned 65 in January. I'm a single homeowner with no
- 19 children and no other living relatives to take care of me
- 20 in the event that I have to be hospitalized or moved from
- 21 my home and I need to sell my property and have to explain
- 22 to a realtor or to someone who takes over my estate that my
- 23 property is entitled for the balance of the grandfathering
- 24 on my solar energy system.
- I want to have some concrete evidence that I can FH-D-19

- 1 take to the Marion County Recorder's Office in the event
- 2 that -- Okay, I'm 65 now. Let's say fast forward 20 years;
- 3 okay, maybe I am incapacitated and go into a nursing home,
- 4 maybe I get Alzheimer's. I have no idea where these
- 5 documents are. At that point, I may not even remember what
- 6 net metering was or that the next property owner is
- 7 entitled to that privilege because I got in under the wire.
- 8 Let me address another personal issue, and that
- 9 is, and this has been going on for quite sometime, but as I
- 10 understand it, Indianapolis Power & Light is the only
- 11 investor-owned electric utility that will not, cannot, and
- 12 does not provide detailed billing statements for its
- 13 customers.
- I have asked in the past. I asked again
- 15 recently. The response I got from someone who I do know
- 16 personally at IPL was, well, gee, Laura, you know how to
- 17 use the tariff sheets. You know how to go and find the
- 18 riders and the rates that change every three months and
- 19 every six months. You know how to use an Excel
- 20 spreadsheet. You can calculate all of this, and my
- 21 response was, yeah, me and how many other people on one
- 22 hand can I count -- and Kerwin Olson doesn't count because
- 23 he's not an IPL customer -- that know how to do that?
- 24 That's not the point.
- The company should be required to do whatever

- 1 software changes are necessary to make that data available
- 2 right now because I'm reconciling the reports from my
- 3 SolarEdge solar system. I now have a plug-in vehicle, a
- 4 Chevy Volt. I have bad knees, and I needed to get out of
- 5 my five-speed transmission 2006 PT Cruiser.
- 6 You know what, when I've called in -- I know at
- 7 the last field hearing, people were bemoaning the
- 8 executives. I am intimately familiar with the number of
- 9 employees who have been laid off. The problem is now when
- 10 you call in to the switchboard and I ask somebody, who do I
- 11 talk to about net metering, they don't -- they didn't know.
- 12 They didn't even know what the term was. I said, well, who
- 13 replaced -- and I'll use a name here -- who replaced
- 14 John Haselden that I could talk to? Who? Now, I happen to
- 15 know names of other people so I could go down the list
- 16 until I found somebody that I could talk to about my
- 17 issues.
- 18 Let me, then, switch to the handouts. There are
- 19 a couple things. We are fortunate tonight with the first
- 20 thing on my handout is a comparison of IPL's proposed
- 21 monthly fixed charges as being the most expensive in the
- 22 region, and the person who compiled this data actually is
- 23 in the room and intends to speak tonight so I will not take
- 24 away his thunder. I did confirm earlier today that he
- 25 would be here after, of course, I had made my handouts.

The other report that I want to make you aware of 2 is called "Caught in a Fix", and this is "The Problem with 3 Fixed Charges for Electricity", and this is a report that 4 was prepared for Consumers Union in 2016 by Synapse Energy 5 Economics in Cambridge, Massachusetts. They testify in 6 many -- before utility commissions all throughout the 7 United States. I have included a copy of the "Executive 9 Summary". It's about a 50-odd-some page document, and I 10 would like to have the entire document placed in the 11 record, and I will be happy to either supply a hard copy or 12 an electronic copy which might be more useful, but these 13 increased fixed charges harm customers. They reduce 14 customer control; low-usage customers are hit hardest; 15 there are disproportionate impacts on low-income customers. 16 My particular issue is they provide reduced incentives for 17 energy efficiency and distributed generation. They also 18 increase electricity system costs. 19 "Holding all else equal, if the fixed charge is 20 increased, the energy charge (cents per kilowatt-hour) will 21 be reduced, thereby lowering the value of a kilowatt-hour 22 conserved or generated by a customer. With little 23 incentive to save, customers may actually increase their 24 energy consumption. . . Where electricity demand rises,

25 utilities will need to invest in new power plants, power

- 1 lines, and substations. . . "
- 2 The document goes through a number of myths about
- 3 fixed charges. There is also -- In particular, I will
- 4 point out to you a chart that is particularly relevant to
- 5 my interest in the document. What it does is it shows a
- 6 chart -- I'm going to say one, two, three pages into my
- 7 document, it shows how increasing the monthly fixed charge
- 8 under Figure 9 -- at the top, Figure 9 shows "Rooftop solar
- 9 payback period under various customer charges".
- Now, this is not an apples to apples comparison
- 11 here. This comes from a report done two years ago, but it
- 12 essentially shows that with a \$9 monthly fixed charge, the
- 13 payback period is 19 years; a \$25 fixed charge, the payback
- 14 period goes to 23 years, and with a \$50 per month fixed
- 15 charge, the payback period goes to 37 years.
- 16 So essentially we have a proposed increase in the
- 17 fixed charge going to \$27 per month, and so that's
- 18 somewhere between on this chart the \$25 and \$50 fixed
- 19 charge. I'm not sure that there's supporting evidence in
- 20 the record, and I think this is an issue that is continuing
- 21 to rise in particular cases, and I think it's one that the
- 22 Commission needs to set aside and perhaps have a generic
- 23 proceeding or look at the issue of what is going on in
- 24 terms of increasing these monthly fixed rates.
- 25 Also, I don't know what other people were doing FH-D-23

- 1 in 1978, but I was an energy activist back then. I was
- 2 around when the Public Utility Regulatory Policies Act of
- 3 1978 was passed, and a part of that was to look at utility
- 4 rate structures like declining block rates that do not
- 5 encourage energy efficiency, energy conservation, but in
- 6 this case, we still have for Rate RS for Residential
- 7 Service a declining block. Now, the declining block is
- 8 getting smaller.
- 9 Forty years since the passage of PURPA in 1978,
- 10 here in Indiana we are still talking and authorizing
- 11 declining block rates. I went to a national solar
- 12 conference a number of years ago and mentioned this to my
- 13 colleagues, and they're, like, you're kidding. It was,
- 14 like, what's wrong with the people in Indiana?
- Other states, more progressive states, that are
- 16 serious about conservation and energy efficiency have,
- 17 guess what, they have inverted rates or inclining rates to
- 18 give market signals to customers to have the kind of
- 19 behavior we wish for them to have, and that is to conserve
- 20 energy along with having energy efficiency programs to help
- 21 them to weatherize their homes and to reduce their
- 22 consumption.

23 least afford it, and this, perhaps, should be adequate
24 reason in itself for denying the rate increase request, but
25 I'd also like to speak to the fixed rate charges primarily
                                          FH-D-26
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- 1 because it serves additionally to the justice issue as a
- 2 disincentive to conserving energy. People are going to pay
- 3 more regardless of how much they turn down the thermostat
- 4 in the winter or turn it up in the summer.
- 5 Purdue University has been working in recent
- 6 years on something called the Indiana Climate Change Impact
- 7 Assessment. It has brought together over 100 experts in
- 8 the field of climate change as well as 50 organizations
- 9 that adhere to the strictest scientific standards, and it
- 10 is as authoritative as we're going to get about climate
- 11 change and what's at stake in our current time.
- Here's some of its findings. Indiana
- 13 temperatures under any scenario will increase, especially
- 14 in extreme days; that is, temperatures above 95 degrees.
- 15 The upper part of the chart that you have is the Purdue
- 16 forecast for two different scenarios based upon carbon
- 17 emissions.
- 18 Historically, Marion County has experienced an
- 19 average of four extreme heat days per year. In one
- 20 scenario that you have before you, if we continue down the
- 21 path we are, you'll see that will increase significantly so
- 22 that by the year 2080, we will have no fewer than 76 days
- 23 in which the temperature rises over 95 degrees. That's if
- 24 we continue our current way of doing business; however,
- 25 there is some hope if we reduce our carbon emissions, there

- 1 will be 38 such days, which is a lot but half the number, a
- 2 very significant difference.
- 3 The bottom part of your chart there shows what
- 4 was a graphic that I thought brought it home very nicely.
- 5 They wanted to determine what the climate would be like in
- 6 Indiana in the future, and they found places where -- what
- 7 it would be like; so they simply moved it south. Under the
- 8 medium scenario in which significant steps are taken to
- 9 reduce our carbon emissions, you can see where somewhere
- 10 around the southern border -- Indianapolis will be
- 11 somewhere around the southern border of Tennessee, and it
- 12 would remain there in 2080. However, if we do not take
- 13 significant steps, by the year 2040, our climate will be
- 14 similar to that in southern Arkansas, and if we continue
- 15 that, by -- 2040, it will be like Arkansas, and by 2080,
- 16 the climate here will be something like that in southern
- 17 Texas.
- 18 What the report states is, and I quote, to
- 19 achieve the medium scenario, that's the best case of --
- 20 before you, global greenhouse gas emissions must be
- 21 significantly reduced almost immediately and peak in the
- 22 2040s before declining. Under high scenario, greenhouse
- 23 gas emissions continue to increase. We are currently on
- 24 the high emission path.
- Not only that, but the latest report from the FH-D-28

- 1 climate assessment indicates increased temperatures will
- 2 have a dramatic impact on the health of Hoosiers,
- 3 especially the young, the old, and the poor. Among many
- 4 other heat -- health-related health problems --
- 5 heat-related health problems, the report projects an
- 6 increase in heart disease, asthma, emphysema, and
- 7 heatstroke. The allergy season will be extended. The
- 8 number of ticks will increase, and with that, the number of
- 9 tick-borne diseases, and also mosquitoes, and further,
- 10 cities like Indianapolis will be especially affected
- 11 because cities are considered to be heat islands that
- 12 capture heat.
- 13 IPL's rate increase reduces the incentive of
- 14 conservation at precisely that moment when we need to do
- 15 everything in our power to reduce our consumption of fossil
- 16 fuels. If IPL does, indeed, need higher income, and that's
- 17 a dubious point, these should be leveled not in terms of
- 18 fixed charges but on those who use the most energy to make
- 19 it a disincentive to do just that. Furthermore, any rate
- 20 changes should require and mandate that dramatic steps be
- 21 taken to decrease carbon emissions and turn towards cleaner
- 22 energy.
- I'm the grandfather of two amazing boys. About a
- 24 week ago, my wife and I were able to take our eight-year
- 25 old to Eagle Creek and helped to -- start to introduce him

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1 to the wonders of nature in springtime. He was amazed and
 2 delighted at the flowers that were blooming, at the trees
 3 that were just beginning to come out, at the birds that
 4 were returning he learned from a thousand miles away or
 5 more. He was amazed by this world of natural beauty.
             The decision about IPL's rate increase is part of
 6
 7 the question of whether or not my grandchildren will be
 8 able to do that same thing with their grandchildren when
 9 they are my age.
             I plead with the Commission to deny IPL's request

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1 services to my home in Hendricks County. I also applaud
 2 IPL for wind power, that I can choose wind power on my
 3 bill; however, what I don't like about my bill are those
 4 hidden expenses that are not given. Other utility
 5 companies in Indiana will spell out the expenses of
 6 where -- what other expenses are entailed in their -- in
 7 their bills to each of the customers, and I know at times
8 that becomes lengthy, but here I just have a rate, and that
9 rate is given. I don't know what part of that rate is
10 hidden and what part of that rate is actually electricity.
11 I would like more disclosure on those bills.

             I can't go to another electric company; IPL has
13 got me, and I encourage IPL greatly to use renewable

- 3 request; namely, IPL's proposal to increase the residential
- 4 customer charge to \$27 per month.
- I ask in particular that you reject IPL's request
- 6 to increase the residential customer charge because it is
- 7 already the highest customer charge among investor-owned
- 8 utilities in Indiana and in neighboring states. In fact,
- 9 if the Commission grants IPL's requested increase in full,
- 10 we will have the most expensive customer charge in the
- 11 nation among all major investor-owned utilities.
- 12 I have attached to my testimony today a table of
- 13 165 utility fixed charges that were in effect at the time
- 14 the analysis was completed in the Fall of 2017. The table
- 15 shows that currently the highest residential fixed charge
- 16 in the country at an investor-owned utility is \$25 per
- 17 month and the average is less than \$11 per month.
- 18 In addition to avoiding the dubious distinction
- 19 of having the most expensive fixed charge in the nation,
- 20 there are four key reasons that I believe the Commission
- 21 should reject IPL's request to increase the fixed charge.
- 22 First, higher fixed customer charges reduce
- 23 customer control and disempower customers. With higher
- 24 fixed charges, the only way to avoid the fixed charge is to
- 25 stop being a utility customer, and that's not realistic for

- 1 most Hoosiers.
- 2 Second, low-usage customers are hardest hit when
- 3 fixed charges rise. IPL's own testimony shows this exact
- 4 phenomenon. The less energy an IPL customer uses, the
- 5 higher the percentage increase they will experience under
- 6 IPL's proposal. For example, according to IPL's own filing
- 7 in this case, a millionaire living in a massive mansion on
- 8 Geist that uses 7,000 kilowatt hours per month will only
- 9 get hit with a 6 percent bill increase. Meanwhile, those
- 10 of us in more modest houses or apartments using 800
- 11 kilowatt hours per month, for example, will get hit with a
- 12 14 percent rate hike.
- This underscores my third point, low-income
- 14 customers are disproportionately affected by hikes to fixed
- 15 charges as they tend to be low-usage customers. If you
- 16 grant IPL's request, you will be increasing the bills of
- 17 those who can least afford to pay it.
- 18 Finally, it is important that our state continues
- 19 to take advantage of the benefits of clean -- excuse me --
- 20 of energy efficiency and distributed generation.
- 21 Increasing the fixed charge component means families will
- 22 have longer payback periods over which to recoup their
- 23 initial investment on clean energy solutions, everything
- 24 from LED lightbulbs to solar.
- In conclusion, I urge the Commission to deny FH-D-35

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1 IPL's request. If anything, I ask that you consider
 2 lowering the customer charge back to where it was just a
 3 couple years ago at $11 per month which is very close to
 4 the national average.
             I also ask that the Commission consider opening a
 6 utility of the future or similar type of proceeding like we
 7 have seen in other Midwestern states. Those include
8 Illinois, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota, and just a couple days
9 ago, Pennsylvania. So this is a common sense approach for
10 engaging stakeholders in important and current issues that
11 include things like rate design, new technology deployment,
12 and utility business models for the 21st century.

- 8 high bills. For customers who are trying to be energy
- 9 efficient, this rate increase fixes the cost burden

If it's getting it to my house, I ask you, and 10 I'll tell you my experience in 49 years, I only once saw a 11 pole replaced, a transformer replaced, or a wire replaced, 12 only once in 49 years, and that happened to be this year 13 when IPL required my church to upgrade its service because 14 we put some solar panels on our property, and they didn't 15 do it for free. We had to pay them \$28,400 for the 16 privilege of hooking our solar panels to their grid. 23 politician when he's trying to discredit his opponent who's
24 complaining about, you know, deeper social problems or
25 economic problems in this country that, oh, you're

- 1 advocating class warfare. The middle and lower classes
- 2 income-wise in this country are in a class warfare whether
- 3 they want to be in one or not. That's the case.
- I understand most of the people on the Commission
- 5 and on the panel tonight have annual incomes that are not
- 6 representative of most residents of Indianapolis. I'm
- 7 asking all of you to understand that your experience of
- 8 your own budgets and of the budgets of people that most of
- 9 you know are nothing like what most citizens of
- 10 Indianapolis have to deal with.
- 11 When you people make a decision about this rate
- 12 increase, whether you realize it or not, you're going to be
- 13 deciding how many people are going to have to move out of

- 3 We have a monopoly that has -- whose parent
- 4 company, AES, had \$2 billion in assets left over after its
- 5 expenses were met and after its dividends were paid last

- 7 pointed out by other speakers, after its rates have risen
- 8 45 percent in the last ten years. This, ladies and
- 9 gentlemen, is unconscionable.
- 10 This is an assault on the citizens of
- 11 Indianapolis; it's an assault by a company that -- whose
- 12 service is less than stellar. In recent years, we've had
- 13 issues reported that people know about of explosions under
- 14 the streets of downtown Indianapolis. Grates were
- 15 installed. Apparently, it was not worth AES/IPL's time and
- 16 energy and effort to do preventative maintenance to address
- 17 the root causes of these explosions to properly service
- 18 their under the street equipment in Indianapolis.
- 19 There are many times when there are storms, not
- 20 even tornadoes, just ordinary summer or late spring
- 21 thunderstorms in Indianapolis, and people have to go hours
- 22 and days without electrical service. How many people in
- 23 their 50s, 60s, or 70s growing up in this town remember
- 24 having to wait 12 hours or two or three days before their
- 25 service went back on after a thunderstorm? It's happening

1 now; it wasn't happening then, so we have an evident
 2 degradation of service.
 3
             As other people pointed out, the -- a major
 4 component of the rate increase request is the fact that it
 5 applies to the fixed portion of the rate, which creates a
 6 disincentive for energy conservation, so naturally you have
 7 a vicious cycle. You have less energy conservation,
 8 meaning higher energy consumption, more demand for more
 9 equipment to be installed, for more generating plants to be
10 constructed, and guess what? We're back here in two years
11 or five years with another hearing because another rate
12 increase request is on the table because very little
13 incentive for energy consumption has been -- for energy
14 conservation, rather, has been offered.

             So for all these reasons, I ask that this
16 Commission, pursuant to its statutory mission, come to the
17 conclusion that contrary to IPL's contention, its rate

- Several things come to mind; one is considering
 the rate inflation. I know I am three days away from
 turning 75 years of age. Social security is coming. Some
 major pensions that I have not major pensions, minor
 pensions, and I also have a part-time job to help make some
 sextra money to support myself. Inflation has a rate that
 is stated each year, and if we started looking at some of
 these increases perhaps on a staggered basis rather than
 one fell swoop staggered over the life that is anticipated
 for the rate increase prior to the filing for the next one,
 which we know will happen, this might help people in
 working with their budgets.
- I would also implore the utility not to give away

- 1 the store as they sometimes are wanton to do in attracting
- 2 businesses to the area. I am all for economic development
- 3 in the area as well; it brings us jobs, et cetera, et
- 4 cetera, but if the utility offers such a deal that the

- 9 I am deeply saddened since moving here to this

- 23 being converted if at all from the conventional lights that
- 24 we use now, the vapor lights, to the LEDs. Abysmally slow.

- 14 going to drastically increase our monthly electric budget
- 15 or bill. My husband and I, our salaries are not going to
- 16 go up 59 percent. I own my own business; I already work a
- 17 full work week. My husband works a full-time job and a
- 18 part-time job. There's no more squeezing blood out of that
- 19 turnip. I'm not quite sure where that money is going to
- 20 go, so a home that we've invested in for 30 years we may no
- 21 longer be able to afford, and where will we go, and you
- 22 will lose not only our economic contribution but also the
- 23 skills and talent that we have built up in this community
- 24 for the past 30 some years.
- I have two simple recommendations for the

- 1 Commission to consider. In my previous life as a writer
- 2 producer, I know that it -- that IPL runs a multi-million
- 3 dollar campaign, and for the life of me, I cannot
- 4 understand why a monopoly has to run a broadcast campaign
- 5 and telling us how great they are. So I begin by asking
- 6 IPL to kind of look at do we really need a promotional

- 18 employees and share with their -- but they're likely to
- 19 just share it with their shareholders and Board of
- 20 Directors, which is -- you know, I can't stop them, but at
- 21 the same time, I just kind of look at it as why are you
- 22 bothering, you know, the customers?
- 23 It just seems so unfair that they want to be
- 24 pushing to get something when really they should be moving
- 25 toward us and trying to make us feel as though we are

1 warranted as a customer. We don't have an option; they 2 know it, and trying to deal with a monopoly on any basis, 3 customer service, whatever you want, there are no ways to 4 win. The only way to win is to be able to turn your back 5 and go to someone else. Because of that, you are the only 6 representative we have to push them back, and they will try 7 a number of tricks, but it requires analysis. They can 8 create blackouts, poor service, become delinquent. They 9 can do anything and say we need money; we need 10 infrastructure. The reality is somebody has got to watch. 11 Somebody has to know that they are poorly managing services 12 just so they can gain a rate increase which they will pass 13 on to their Board of Directors and shareholders. Based on 14 that, I want -- I implore you to deny them a rate increase. 15 They have the money. They don't need any more. 16 One other point: Their financing is not day to 17 day. A large organization that can issue bonds that go on 18 for 30 to 50 years, they can buy out anything they want and 19 finance themselves to the hilt. Why they don't do it --20 why are they so narrow-minded on just taking the monthly 21 fee from every customer? Just things to consider. 22 Thank you for your time. 23 MR. Last ten years, IPL has raised its rates

- 1 47 percent. It's proposing a raise that would be an
- 2 average of 25 percent across the board resulting in a
- 3 profit estimation next year of an additional \$95 million in
- 4 their pocket.
- 5 This company over the last year has reported
- 6 higher increases in dividends paid to its shareholders and
- 7 higher profit margins. They are making statements about --
- 8 they understand there are consumers that can barely afford
- 9 their bill, so their suggestion is those that can afford
- 10 the new increase round up so that those who cannot afford
- 11 it will be covered. How human of them; how nice. Instead
- 12 of being worried about those people, they're worried about
- 13 their profit margin. That's terrible. That's absolutely

            A good consumer for all this increase would

- 19 could damage your front end, and we all know that we're
- 20 going to have to pay for that. Indianapolis, with how much
- 21 they've had to fix, we're going to pay for that, and let's
- 22 not forget the school system, and let's not forget the
- 23 property tax increases related to that.
- I mean, it's just like it never stops, and, you
- 25 know, we all know in life that there are going to be

- 1 increases, but when a company that made \$11 billion in
- 2 revenue last year and has \$33 billion in assets is asking
- 3 to raise your power bill and make you bleed more, it really
- 4 hurts, and I commend IPL on some things.
- Now, I know there are people that have had a lot
- 6 of power outages and that kind of thing. I have power
- 7 outages. I've been very fortunate. I've not had any
- 8 problem with them getting the lights back on. Usually when
- 9 I call on a streetlight, it's fixed in several days. What
- 10 I do notice having been a lifelong Indianapolis resident
- 11 and being the one in my neighborhood and as a resident of
- 12 the city that calls on chuckholes, streetlights, they're
- 13 out, and anything that I think is something I can do to
- 14 help get things fixed is that a lot of the streetlights
- 15 downtown that apparently from what people are saying the
- 16 city has made an agreement not to fight this or to stand
- 17 before you tonight, I've called -- I've made at least one
- 18 or two calls to IPL to ask them to fix the streetlights
- 19 along White River Parkway because I drove to work in the
- 20 dark all winter, to and from work in the dark along White
- 21 River Parkway West.
- 22 While IPL and other corporations are getting a
- 23 huge tax increase, my tax -- or my withholding amount
- 24 changed when I annualized it, and it only averages out to
- 25 like \$193.00 a year. I'm a single person, so I don't have

- 1 any big tax breaks of any kind to get, and that's going
- 2 away in five years.
- 3 So at this time when I look at my budget, I'm
- 4 spending money to survive for today that I should be using
- 5 to put away for retirement tomorrow. I'm not a member of a
- 6 labor union. I don't get any special privileges, and it's
- 7 up to me, and, you know -- and I know I'm in much better
- 8 shape than a lot of people. I haven't missed any meals
- 9 lately, but I can tell you this is extremely disappointing,
- 10 and it's a real blow, and it's hard when you see a city
- 11 like Indianapolis that has companies getting tax abatements
- 12 left and right. You know, I grew up in the shadow of the
- 13 Motor Speedway, and I believe they get a big tax abatement,
- 14 and now I live close to the Colts' complex and those kind
- 15 of places. As a consumer -- or as a taxpayer, I feel like
- 16 I get very little sometimes, and who's representing me,
- 17 and, you know, again, it's not about just me.
- 18 I've been in a position where I've been fortunate
- 19 enough to be in healthcare customer service for pretty much
- 20 my entire career, and I can tell you the things that people
- 21 call up and have told me over the years about what it takes
- 22 for them to survive. The stories I hear at church and from
- 23 people around the community, it's very troubling that IPL
- 24 is asking for this increase.
- When I tried to Google AES today, everything I

- 1 kept hitting up against was about how it's a great place
- 2 to -- it's a great company to invest in, and I don't
- 3 begrudge anyone for living in a big house, for working
- 4 hard, for doing well, but I would say if you have any sense
- 5 of justice, if social justice means anything to you
- 6 personally, if the condition of your neighbors -- and I
- 7 don't mean just the people on either side of you but the
- 8 people that live in your community and work in your
- 9 community -- means anything to you, please don't allow this
- 10 rate increase. I would ask you to deny their rate increase
- 11 in Cause No. 45029.
- 12 Another thing that I'm going to say just real
- 13 quickly is I have a 962 square foot house. I'm one person.
- 14 I control the electric usage, and while I'm not perfect, I
- 15 do pretty good, and the things that I could improve on is I
- 16 could fix the broken heating ducts that I have, but that's
- 17 expensive. Right now, I haven't really thought about how
- 18 I'm going to afford that, and when I set my house at 65
- 19 during the day and I shiver and I'm cold and walk around
- 20 the house in a winter coat while I'm fixing dinner in the
- 21 evening and in the morning before I go to work with a
- 22 winter coat on, it just really makes me mad having to think
- 23 about this rate increase.
- It's -- You know, I looked at my power bill like
- 25 a lot of people did, and my usage last month was

```
1 1,263 kilowatts. That was for April. Now I realize we had
 2 a cold winter, but this is Indiana, and we do get cold
 3 winters here once in a while even with global warming, so
 4 this is going to devastate a lot of people, so I hope
 5 everybody will think about this and take these comments
 6 into consideration.
 7

- I'd like to start out by pointing out that I am
- 2 opposed to this rate increase both as a residential
- 3 consumer and as a business consumer.
- I have to say that I am intimidated by a lot of
- 5 the testimony I've heard from some of my fellow citizens
- 6 tonight indicating that this would have a negative impact
- 7 on their household incomes in such a way that might reduce
- 8 their ability to participate in our local economy which is
- 9 deeply concerning to me as a small business leader.
- 10 Currently, we're experiencing a boom based on
- 11 construction going on in town, and if we can't sustain
- 12 those gains, then our small businesses will begin to
- 13 shrivel and suffer as a result of this.
- I would also like to point out that a 2017 U.S.
- 15 energy and employment report showed that over 260,000
- 16 people are currently employed in the production of solar
- 17 energy alone. That compares to less than 200,000 employed
- 18 in the production of coal, gas, and oil combined. In
- 19 addition to that, the earth sustains -- our population
- 20 sustains six to eight million casualties annually from air
- 21 pollution, easily preventable based on a shift in our
- 22 energy system.
- I would like to acknowledge that part of this
- 24 plan is to replace an antiquated coal-fired power plant
- 25 with a relatively new gas power plant. I would like to

```
1 point out that, yes, gas is a cleaner burning fuel, but it
 2 is not a clean fuel as has been marketed by IPL. The
 3 extraction process is, in fact, extremely hazardous and
 4 has -- there are numerous organizations that have made an
 5 effort to document the impacts of gas extraction. I'll
 6 point you toward the Environmental Defense Fund which has
 7 went to -- which has gone to extreme expense to document
8 the leaking of natural gas from wellheads and production
 9 sources.
10
             I might also point out that from June 2015 to
11 June of 2017, there were no less than 12 deaths resulting
12 from pipeline accidents by the associated -- by the
13 assorted fuels being transported through pipelines, and so
14 I implore you to deny this rate increase.
15
             We stand on the threshold of tomorrow, and it's
16 up to us to choose what energy systems we will invest in.
17 Will we choose to democratize our power system going for an
18 energy system that's readily available, or will we choose
19 to put our power into the hands of the privileged few and
20 allow them to maintain a monopoly over all of us?
21
             Thank you for your time.

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- 1 The floor is yours.
- 2 A Thank you.
- I would like to speak on behalf of denying the
- 4 IPL rate increase. When I first came, I really had not
- 5 prepared a speech to share with you this evening, but as I
- 6 sat there, I was compelled to speak on behalf of the people
- 7 that I know are not here because they don't have
- 8 transportation or even the hardship of how many buses they
- 9 would have to take to be able to be here this evening, and
- 10 it's from personal experience.
- 11 My role takes me in and out of a lot of
- 12 households, and I have experience with people from multiple
- 13 cultures who come into our church asking for assistance.
- 14 A couple of scenarios: I went to visit one of
- 15 our elderly parishioners, and when I entered the home, she
- 16 began by asking an apology for the way she was dressed.
- 17 She had on a hat, gloves, and coat in her own house, which
- 18 was a small senior apartment, and she explained that her
- 19 power bill was \$500.00, and she couldn't figure out how in
- 20 one month such a small apartment would have a rate of
- 21 \$500.00 charged to her, and because she couldn't afford it,
- 22 she was turning down her power so low that she was sitting
- 23 in a cold apartment.
- 24 The next scenario I would like to present to you
- 25 is a gentleman who -- during one of our coldest, snowy days

- 1 where we had I think about three or four or maybe more
- 2 inches, and he walked all the way to our church facility to
- 3 ask for assistance, and he told me that he had a home in
- 4 which there was no power on at all. Now when he walked in,
- 5 his feet were soaked from walking in the snow to the degree
- 6 that our carpet was soaked when he left because of how far
- 7 he walked in the cold. Because there are so many people
- 8 constantly coming to the church asking for assistance, we
- 9 did not have enough to help him. I tried to give him as
- 10 many scenarios as possible. One even included asking if he
- 11 would be willing stay in a shelter where at least he knew
- 12 he would have heat. His response to me was, ma'am, I have
- 13 a home. Even though I do not have electricity, I prefer to
- 14 stay in my home. I will not stay in a shelter.
- Then the number of people that are coming asking
- 16 for assistance because their power is almost ready to be
- 17 turned off or has been turned off is increasing on a daily
- 18 basis. As I go through the list of agencies that I know
- 19 are providing assistance, their response is I've already
- 20 tried them, and so even with all of the agencies that are
- 21 trying to currently help IPL customers who can't afford it
- 22 now, I know that they're not going to be able to afford a
- 23 rate increase.
- In my career, I have had to create budgets every
- 25 year, and I know that in creating the budget, we always

```
1 start out with the dream budget, everything that you would
 2 want, but then when you start looking at reality and causes
 3 and effects and so forth, you have to begin to start
 4 cutting somewhere. I know with all of the great minds that
 5 have shared this evening and also all of the great minds
 6 that are sitting with IPL that there are a lot of other
 7 options that we have that can truly take into consideration
 8 the entire citizenry that are using IPL's power. There are
 9 a lot of other options we haven't considered.
10
             So my challenge is let's look at more cost
11 effective ways to serve our public, more energy efficient
12 ways to serve our public, but, most importantly, ways that
13 we can reduce the rate, not increase the rate.

             I didn't come with a prepared speech. I recently
24 heard about this increase but wanted to represent my very
25 large Irish family of the Carrs and a lot of the people

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- 1 that I hear from during my volunteerism with a very large
- 2 non-profit in Indianapolis where I work the help line.
- 3 It really concerns me because all year,
- 4 especially in the winter, I would get the calls for help.
- 5 You know, their power is being turned off or it has been
- 6 turned off for months. One lady comes to mind that had an
- 7 autistic child. She had many issues with the spouse and a
- 8 lot of violence and this, that, and the other, but it's
- 9 just one of many that I heard from all year, and so as a
- 10 help line person, I would refer her or call organizations
- 11 to try to get someone to get her bill paid. The problem is
- 12 in Indianapolis, the funds are dried up. There's a lot of
- 13 people asking for money for the utility bills every year,
- 14 so I'm really concerned that if this is approved, I don't
- 15 see how they're going to pay them when they can't pay them
- 16 now.
- 17 Maybe if you do decide to give some sort of an
- 18 increase that you make the stipulation along with that that
- 19 some of this money and their profits should be donated back
- 20 or create a fund that's larger than the one that they have
- 21 now because it's not enough. There's just so many lower
- 22 income -- I'm on a fixed income. I have no help other than
- 23 what my one check is a month, and I don't have central air.
- 24 I have radiated heat. I don't have, you know, cable. I
- 25 really have cut as low as I can, so, you know -- and I'm

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1 recently treated for cancer, so there's a lot of medical
 2 bills out there which a lot of people that are seniors are
 3 dealing with. We have a lot of baby boomers here -- I'm
 4 one of them -- and, you know, we're all aging and having
 5 issues, so to have more money for a company that already
 6 has such a large profit, it just doesn't seem right to me.
             So I'm hoping that you -- if you do decide to do
 8 that that they at least show on paper or there's some kind
 9 of accountability for all of this extra money, where it's
10 really going to, and that there might be a committee to
11 oversee all of this increase because, you know, they're all
12 stockholders and, you know, we just have to pay the bill or
13 not.
14
            And so in my area, I have been -- was born in
15 Indianapolis. My family has been on this corner in Rocky
16 Ripple for over 75 years, and that's where I was born. I
17 know my meter on that house that my dad built out of brick
18 when I was three, and I think it still has the same meter
19 on it. You know, I was -- bought the house after mom and
20 dad died and moved back into it, so I did a full circle,
21 but I'm pretty sure that our little town -- Every time
22 there's a storm, we lose power, and they say it's the
23 transformers; we have old transformers. So, I mean, just
24 in our little area, I mean, I -- it's just so small
25 compared to the whole big picture, but I am just saying
```

- 1 that where does all this money go that they just keep
- 2 making the profits? I mean, you know.
- I would say one thing about IPL, they are Johnny
- 4 on the spot if they have -- if there's an issue. You know,
- 5 you call, a streetlight's out or if there's a tree that's
- 6 fallen on the wires, they'll send somebody just within a
- 7 couple of hours, you know, so -- but overall, I don't think
- 8 this is justified, and I'll quit. I know everybody's
- 9 tired, but that is a lot, \$27.00 a month. I mean, just in
- 10 our large family of like over 100 in this city, that adds
- 11 up to quite a bit just with our family. So maybe they
- 12 could have less if they do feel it's necessary; it's up to
- 13 you guys maybe to say, well, that was pretty extravagant;
- 14 you know, maybe we should not give that much. They just
- 15 had an increase a couple years ago.
- But also really just that one point I made about
- 17 the people here that are struggling with their utilities
- 18 every winter, maybe increase that -- some of that profit to
- 19 that winter fund because when I sent them to call, and I've
- 20 called for these people, no, there's no money. Yeah, it
- 21 was there, but, unfortunately, it's empty now, so there you
- 22 go, and, you know -- and all the churches that we refer

             I'm here on behalf of a lot of the other people
```

- 1 that worked on the Eagle Valley project. I'm part of one
- 2 of the hundreds of skilled craftsmen that built the plant.
- 3 I personally am a union pipefitter and certified weld
- 4 inspector. I was involved in installing some of the pipe,
- 5 and I was a foreman over the some of the quality control.
- 6 I'm in opposition of this. I agree with a lot of
- 7 the previous speakers and their oppositions. This is just,
- 8 in my opinion, one more.
- 9 They're asking for capital costs on a project
- 10 that's not finished yet; the final numbers are not in yet.
- 11 This was supposed to be a high efficiency gas turbine power
- 12 plant that used even less employees to run, therefore,
- 13 increasing their profit margins. As my late uncle used to
- 14 say -- his favorite saying was figures don't lie, liars
- 15 figure. Where are the numbers? We need to find out what
- 16 happened. We need to look at their preplanned -- they had
- 17 to have a pre-build plan and budget for this. Did it go
- 18 over? What was the final cost of that? You know, how much
- 19 did they make from the contractor that they hired due to
- 20 scheduling issues and penalties that were in the contract?
- 21 You know, has that been added in? As late as the
- 22 contractor was, these penalties, this should be a free
- 23 power plant.
- The contractor had a lot of problems. They
- 25 signed a contract with a foreign company to do this job.

- 1 The company's name is Chicago Bridge & Iron. Sounds pretty
- 2 good. In orientation, the first thing they told us was
- 3 we're not from Chicago; we're from the Netherlands, and we
- 4 don't build bridges, and that statement right there said
- 5 everything about the contractor that IPL hired for this
- 6 job. There are multiple local contractors who could do
- 7 this job and bid on this job. As a matter of fact, Chicago
- 8 Bridge & Iron had to contract these local contractors to
- 9 finish the job, and by their own numbers, when they came in
- 10 with the same manpower that -- Chicago Bridge & Iron had
- 11 laid the men off, and they were rehired by the local
- 12 contractors. By Chicago Bridge & Iron's own numbers, the
- 13 production increased five times, five times. So had they
- 14 hired the local contractors to begin with, just by those
- 15 numbers, it would have been completed five times faster,
- 16 plus all that money would have stayed in the country and in
- 17 our local economy.
- 18 We constantly heard, oh, first fire is scheduled
- 19 for one month, and that would go by multiple times. I was
- 20 there for ten months; I never saw first fire, and it was
- 21 scheduled -- Before I got there, it was scheduled for first
- 22 fire.
- 23 Some of the things that happened -- maybe
- 24 everybody's not a project manager or a construction
- 25 manager, but the underground -- one would figure out that

- 1 you dig the hole, you put the underground piping in and
- 2 systems first, and then you build the things on top of it.
- 3 When I left, they were still digging underground and going
- 4 back because of all of the mistakes they had made.
- 5 They had a code violation which was the fire
- 6 main. The fire main is kind of important on a gas-fired
- 7 turbine. The fire marshal said you can't run this like
- 8 this; it's too small. This is what the contractor did.
- 9 The transformers they installed, too small, the
- 10 two main transformers for a power plant. The shafts on the
- 11 main turbines, all the skilled craftsmen know that once
- 12 that's set, it has to spin; otherwise, it will sag. That's
- 13 a very precise instrument. Toshiba, who owns those, pulled
- 14 their warranty. We won't back that up because you didn't
- 15 spin this and let it sag for months. They had poor
- 16 engineering. I could go on a whole list of problems we had
- 17 with this contractor, this foreign contractor.
- There's multiple quality issues which could
- 19 contribute to major safety issues down the road, and even
- 20 if nobody's certain there's a failure, it's still
- 21 expensive.
- 22 Let's see. IPL -- friends that I still have
- 23 working out there -- has claimed that they're going to take
- 24 ownership finally of this power plant in the next coming
- 25 days or a week or so, but they're going to do it with

```
1 conditions because it's still not correct.
             So my final statement -- Well, the question is:
 3 Why did IPL or AES -- why should we have to bear the
 4 burden, the financial burden, for their poor planning or
 5 their bad negotiation of a contract or their mismanagement
 6 of their contractor, you know? They're in charge.
             So my final statement is: Has the IURC asked for
 7
 8 the final cost on this, and why can they ask for an
 9 increase if the final cost hasn't been tallied or disclosed
10 yet? I feel it's the IURC's duty to demand all these
11 numbers and refuse this increase until all of this has been
12 disclosed and investigated. We just want to make sure
13 there's no backroom deals going on.
14

- 1 Hospital, and I also work at Riley Hospital. 99 percent
- 2 of the patients that I serve are on Medicaid. This rate
- 3 increase will disproportionately affect these patients and
- 4 their families.
- 5 Just this winter, I had a family tell me they
- 6 could not afford their medication because they had to
- 7 decide between keeping their heat on or buying medication.
- 8 The downstream effects of this are catastrophic. Imagine
- 9 that a child goes without their asthma medication because
- 10 the family has to pay for the heat instead, and that child
- 11 has an asthma attack. Without their medication, they end
- 12 up in the emergency department and can even be admitted
- 13 into the hospital or the intensive care unit. This results
- 14 in loss of school days for the children, loss of work days
- 15 for the parents, and increased stress in all of their
- 16 lives.
- 17 In my practice and in my career, I've also seen
- 18 the extreme of what happens when families cannot afford to
- 19 heat their homes. When families have to go without, they
- 20 seek alternatives such as space heaters and burning in
- 21 their homes. These can quickly lead to death from carbon
- 22 monoxide poisoning or from fire.
- 23 I'm not saying this to scare everyone but do use
- 24 these examples to make sure that everyone is fully aware of

Indianapolis Power & Light Company ("Petitioner"), pursuant to 170 IAC 1-1.1-16 and the discovery provisions of Rules 26 through 37 of the Indiana Rules of Trial Procedure, by its counsel, hereby submits the following Objections and Responses to the Citizens Action Coalition of Indiana, Inc.'s ("CAC") Third Set of Data Requests to Indianapolis Power & Light Company ("Requests").

General Objections

A. The responses provided to the Requests have been prepared pursuant to a reasonable and diligent investigation and search conducted in connection with the Requests in those areas where information is expected to be found. To the extent the Requests purport to

require more than a reasonable and diligent investigation and search, Petitioner objects on grounds that they include an undue burden and unreasonable expense.

- B. Petitioner objects to the Requests to the extent they seek documents or information which are not relevant to the subject matter of this proceeding and which are not reasonably calculated to lead to the discovery of admissible evidence.
- C. Petitioner objects to the Requests (including Instruction Nos. 1(a), 1(b) and 2(d)) to the extent they seek responses and information from individuals and entities who are not parties to this proceeding. In particular, Petitioner objects to the CAC's definition of "IPL" as overly broad. Petitioner defines "IPL" for purposes of its responses to include Indianapolis Power & Light Company and its employees. IPL further objects to the Requests to the extent they request the production of information and documents not presently in IPL's possession, custody or control.
- D. Petitioner objects to the Requests to the extent the Requests seek information outside the scope of this proceeding, and as such, the Requests seek information not reasonably calculated to lead to the discovery of relevant or admissible evidence.
- E. Petitioner objects to the Requests to the extent they seek an analysis, calculation, or compilation which has not already been performed and which Petitioner objects to performing.
- F. Petitioner objects to the Requests to the extent they are vague and ambiguous and provide no basis from which Petitioner can determine what information is sought.

- G. Petitioner assumes no obligation to supplement these responses except to the extent required by Ind. Tr. R. 26(E) (1) and (2) and objects to the extent the instructions and/or Requests (including Instruction No. 2(f)) purport to impose any greater obligation.
- H. Petitioner objects to the Requests to the extent they seek information that is subject to the attorney-client, work product, settlement negotiation or other applicable privileges.
- I. The responses constitute the corporate responses of Petitioner and contain information gathered from a variety of sources. Petitioner objects to the Requests (including Instruction Nos. 1(i), 1(j) and 2(g)) to the extent they request identification of and personal information about all persons who participated in responding to each data request on the grounds that they are overbroad and unreasonably burdensome given the nature and scope of the requests and the many people who may be consulted about them.
- J. Petitioner objects to the Requests to the extent the discovery sought is unreasonably cumulative or duplicative, or is obtainable from some other source that is more convenient, less burdensome, or less expensive.
- K. Petitioner objects to the Requests to the extent the burden or expense of the proposed discovery outweighs its likely benefit, taking into account the needs of the case, the amount in controversy, the parties' resources, the importance of the issues at stake in litigation, and the importance of the proposed discovery in resolving the issues.
- L. Petitioner objects to the Requests (including Instruction Nos. 2(g) and 2(h)) to the extent they request identification of witnesses who will be prepared to testify concerning the

matters contained in each response on the grounds that Petitioner is under no obligation to call witnesses to response to questions about information provided in discovery.

Objection:

IPL objects to the Request on the grounds and to the extent the request seeks a compilation, analysis or study that IPL has not performed and to which IPL objects to performing. Subject to and without waiver of the foregoing objections, IPL provides the following response.

Response:

- a. IPL has not performed this analysis, but would note that there have been increased efficiencies in IPL's reconnection and disconnection processes through improvements in work practices.
- b. IPL has not performed this analysis. It is reasonable to attribute some efficiencies in the reconnect and disconnect process due to advanced metering infrastructure.
